The All for Ireland League

Class, Conflict and Conciliation in Cork 1910-1918



A talk by Dr Patrick Murphy

The All for Ireland League, launched in 1909, presented the only organized opposition to the dominant Irish Party in its history. This led to unprecedented levels of violence in Cork during the two general elections of 1910 where the League took eight of the nine parliamentary seats in Cork and gained control of local government in the city and county the following year. It is chiefly remembered for its policy of conciliation with unionists. The League developed its electoral base by co-opting working class dissent. In reality, it was economically and socially conservative, antagonistic to socialism and suspicious of trade unions and the labour movement.

Dr. Patrick Murphy was born in Cork and is now based in England. His PhD thesis from the University of Liverpool was on the All for Ireland League.
